This will give you step-by-step instructions on how to do a deeper study using this tool.

We're going to use Genesis 1:1 as our example verse.

1.Go to either

www.BibleHub.com or

download the BibleHub app on your mobile device.

- 2. At the top, you'll see a window that says REFERENCE or KEYWORD. Type in Genesis 1:1 (screenshot to the right)
- 3. This will take you to a screen with Bible versions in a blue menu bar across the top, other menu items in a white menu bar and the text of the verse in multiple Bible translations and versions. This page is helpful to read the verse in different versions. (screenshot to the right)

- 4. To dig deeper, look in the white menu bar and click the letters INT (in the app) or Interlin (on the website). (screenshot on the right
- 5. Now you'll see a page that has a lot of numbers and the original language. We're going to focus on the top number which is the Strong's number. Look at the word CREATED. The number above it is 1254 (e). click that number. (screenshot to the right)

6. The screen before you has lots of information. It gives you the word, all the definitions when this word is used, the part of language (like a noun, etc) and other info. What I like to see is the broader definitions. For *created* we see the definitions we'd expect—like fashion and shape out. But I also see the fact that this word is used for the process of paring a reed for writing and we're reading the written Word of God. How cool is that?!? (screenshot below on the left)

As you look through the many uses of this specific word, search for the verse you're studying, in our case Genesis 1:1. This gives us more information that pertains directly to that verse. (screenshot belowon the right)
